What is Find A Farmer

Connecting landowners and landseekers to help preserve family farms.

- Launched in 2011
- Platform for anonymous land-transfer conversations to begin
- Uniqueness: Ability to share your story
- Currently 2,000+ users
- 25% land owners; 75% land seekers





Here's How it Works

- 1. Create an account
- 2. **Build a profile** that describes your desired farm characteristics (as a land-seeker) or your farm's details (as a landowner)
- 3. **Tell your story**—what you have, what you're looking for, your values and experience; and upload photos
- 4. **Use the search tool** to look for landowners or land-seekers that meet your criteria
- 5. **Start a conversation** by adding a friend or prospect and sending a message

We are interested in growing non-GMO crops, (both non-GMO corn and beans) and we are also open to growing industrial hemp.




