Meet a CoHort: Wade Dooley

Wade Dooley farms around 200 acres in Albion, Iowa, where he raises and sells cover crop seeds and does custom seeding. He also grows popcorn and ornamental corn as well as pumpkins, which he plants into roller-crimped rye.

Why do you grow hort crops in five or fewer words: More exciting than row crops.

What is something you're excited about this year: I'm ridiculously excited about something that's totally silly. That's my new-to-me corn binder to make corn bundles. I'm going to use it to make ornamental corn bundles this fall.

What is one thing you would change about your industry: The insular nature of production agriculture in general makes it hard to focus on more than what's right in front of you. It would be great to see more cross-pollination between farmers growing different things, whether it's a horticulture farmer talking to a cattle producer or a field crop farmer talking with a flower grower.

Favorite PFI memory: Several years ago, after the banquet at the Cooperators' Meeting, a group of original PFI members and some of us younger folks went out for drinks and conversation. We stayed out to the wee hours solving all the world's problems. That's one of my treasured memories.

Your favorite crop and why: I don't grow watermelons anymore, but I still love them. They seem so easy to grow, but then there are a ton of challenges. If you do it right and get the right varieties, everyone loves the product.
