Farmers consider third crops and livestock integration at the Midwest Covers and Grains Conference

Despite a March snowstorm, around 70 people gathered in Baraboo, Wisconsin, on March 5 for the third annual Midwest Covers and Grains Conference.

Farmers from across the Midwest spent time networking, attending farmer-led sessions and swapping knowledge. Taking a break from their winter chores, many livestock farmers came to explore incorporating small grains and cover crops for animal feed.

Research: "Bale Grazing Effects on Soil and Pasture Plant Communities"



Bale grazing is a way of feeding livestock in the winter by providing hay to animals out on the land, instead of indoors.

Adam Ledvina bale-grazes goats on pasture and was curious to learn how animal traffic near the unspooled bales affected the soil and plant community.

Bale grazing offers advantages like introducing nutrients back to the pasture and potentially improving plant diversity by rolling out hay, allowing for reseeding. <u>See the full trial results.</u>

Seeking to put highly erodible areas of the farm into conservation, a PFI farmer (who wished to remain anonymous) used precision conservation to convert hilly areas into habitat and to filter soil runoff from the areas of the farm still in production.

Using satellite imagery, **Stephanie Nelson** of Pheasants Forever identified areas that could be restored to habitat, practically down to the square meter, following the landowner's goals to leave as much land in row crop as possible. **Read the blog post.**
